Joseph was glad he chose to keep following God's way, to listen to Him, and to be an honest, diligent worker.

Maybe your family was travelling and the car broke down, and you were somewhere where it was difficult to get help. Or maybe you were working on a project and you were missing one of the most important things you needed to complete it?

There are lots of different problems and difficulties that come our way, and people can cause us trouble too, but no matter how tough things seem, nothing is too hard for God. He can give the help and solutions needed to anyone, anywhere, if they pray and believe that He can.

After the Israelites left Egypt, Pharaoh decided that he wanted the people to come back to work for him again—and not go off taking a trip!

He sent many of his people to get them to return. This seemed to be a problem for the travelling team, because in front of them was the big Red Sea.

They were stuck and couldn't go any further. God had a plan, and told Moses to stretch out his hands and rod over the water.

The amazing miraculous solution began. A strong wind blew and blew, and everyone was in for a surprise.

Can you imagine camping beside a large lake, and after a time of strong wind there is then a pathway right through it, and you can walk, or bike, or drive over to the other side? That's the surprise they all got! God had made a pathway straight across the Red Sea with the water standing up on either side of it. The Israelites walked to the other side on the dry sea bed!

God got them safely across the Red Sea, and then closed up the water again. It was so amazing! It was time to praise God with songs and instruments! They were so happy to see the power of God helping them. They were then able to continue their journey, with a God who could do anything to lead and care for them.

Wilderness, Water and Wells

When you are hungry, tired or thirsty it's hard to be cheerful. It was just the same for the team of travelling Israelites. They were taking a journey through a difficult place.

God was taking good care of them, as they followed Him and loved Him.

Ruth was a kind and loving woman and Boaz chose to marry her. Together they had a dear little baby whom they called Obed.

Grandmother Naomi was happy to help care for her new grandson. They were a happy family, and all things had worked out for the best in the end.

Hannah's Prayer and Promise

Hannah was a woman who loved God very much and took time to talk with Him in prayer. She knew God answered prayer even if some prayers took a long time to be answered.

As soon as you pray, God hears what you ask for, but it's not always the best time or way for your request to be answered right then and there. Sometimes you have to wait for awhile, and then it works out for the best in the end.

Little Boy Samuel

Then Samuel told Saul that he was an important man and he was just the person that the people were wanting.

Saul didn't understand that. He didn't think of himself as being anyone extra special. Even though he was tall and strong and could do lots of things, he was humble and thought of others as better than himself. But a humble man who prays and knows that he needs God's help is the best kind of man for the job of being a king.

Samuel poured some special oil on Saul's head, as a demonstration of God's spirit and power helping him to do the job of soon becoming the king of the country. Saul went home then to help his father until it was the time to be crowned as king later on.

King Saul

The prophet Samuel talked with Saul, after he had poured oil on his head to show that he was to be the king of the land of Israel. The Lord told Samuel just what was going to happen next on Saul's journey back home to his father.

Each of the events happened, just as Samuel said they would! Saul was amazed. It was a sign to him that God was leading him to do that new and special job.

On his way home Saul met a group of prophets who were making music and were prophesying. The Lord's Spirit was on Saul and he began to prophesy as well. People who knew him from before were surprised!

Saul was like a new man, with new thoughts and feelings and reactions. God had changed his heart and given him the ability to do the job of being the future king.

Prophet Samuel called all the people together to let them know who was to be their king.

People from all the tribes of Israel were there. This was a very important event for them.

First, God let them know what tribe the king would come from, and then He revealed what family the king was to be from. And last of all God showed who from that family was to be the king.

It was clear to all, after finding out step-by-step who God wanted it to be, that Saul was the one that God had chosen to be the king.

Saul was feeling nervous and shy about being a king when he saw all those people together, so he hid.

But God told Samuel where Saul was—he was hiding by all the stuff that was in a pile.

When Saul stood up he was a very tall man and everyone shouted, "God save the King!"

A Thundery Demonstration

It was very important that King Saul and all the people follow God's Words and instructions and not choose to go their own wrong way.

Samuel told everyone the Lord's Words and reminded them that God was in charge and the wise thing to do would be to listen to Him and obey Him.

Everyone had pushed to have their own way—to have a king as a ruler—even though God had told them that it wouldn't make things easier.

They were sorry for not listening to God better and not choosing to have things His way, even though it was different than what other countries had.

But then Samuel encouraged them with God's Words, that even if they had demanded to be given something that was not God's best choice for them, it was still possible to have things go well in the country if they all—including the king—were faithful to follow in God's ways.

Then Samuel prayed and God showed everyone a sign to let them know that He was right there.

Even though it was a sunny day, Samuel prayed and God sent thunder and rain right then!

God was so powerful and near to them all and He knew everything that was going on.

Everyone realised that following and respecting God was the best thing to do.

A Good Heart

It was a big job for Saul to be the king, and one thing you really need if you are the king is faith. However, instead of having the faith to obey the Lord's instructions, Saul chose rather to do the things that others thought were best.

He disobeyed what God, through Samuel the prophet, said for him to do. If he'd had more faith and trust in God's plan and care, then he would have been more obedient to God's words.

Because Saul did what others said to do, out of fear or worry, rather than what God asked him to, it displeased God and showed a lack of faith in Him. Samuel needed to find someone else to be the king; someone who would do what God asked them to do.

God told Samuel that one of Jesse's sons in Bethlehem was to eventually be the new king. Samuel invited Jesse and all his grown sons to a feast.

One-by-one the men stood in front of Samuel to see which one was to be chosen. God said that being tall and strong and good-looking wasn't going to make them a good king.

God looks on the heart and what people are feeling and thinking and what they are motivated to do.

None of Jesse's seven sons that stood there for Samuel to choose from received God's approval for being the king.

Samuel asked if Jesse had any more sons, and he said "Yes". His youngest, David, was watching over the sheep.

When he came and stood before Samuel, God said that he, this young man David, was to be the next king after Saul.

Samuel poured the special oil on David's head, and God's Spirit came on him.

It would be years before David was the king, but with God's Spirit he could make wise decisions while preparing to be the king, and learning just what he needed to know before it was time to rule the country.

David's Harp

Do you like to play music? David did, and he could play so beautifully. People all around where he lived, knew he could play songs to God on his harp very skillfully. He had lots of time to practice while watching over the sheep. He used his time well, singing and talking with the Lord.

One time, when King Saul was feeling very grumpy, some people suggested that songs and music might cheer him up. "Who could we bring to sing and play music for the king?" they wondered. God had them think of David the shepherd, who they had heard was good at playing the harp.

Now David's times of practice came in handy, as he was able to play music and sing songs to the king, and it made King Saul feel so much better. Music can really have an effect on you. If you are listening and playing nice songs, songs that fill your heart and mind with good thoughts and feelings, then music can be a good thing. It's a wonderful way to praise and pray and cheer people up.

David was invited to live and work with the king. David loved God and had God's spirit helping him. He was wise and acted humbly, and he obeyed what the king asked him to do. He prayed for God to help him do what was good and right and what would be a help to others. Jonathan, King Saul's son, was a good friend to David. They talked together and encouraged each other through difficult times.

After Saul had been the king for quite awhile, sadly he stopped doing things in God's way; and he no longer was empowered with God's spirit. King Saul was often upset and making unwise decisions, and saying things that weren't good. David was very patient and calm even when King Saul said unkind things about him. David had faith that God would work things out. He trusted in God and was able to do a good job because he prayed and took time talking with the Lord.

Psalms and Supply

David had many difficulties and hard times. He learned to trust in God through his problems. He wrote songs and psalms that told others—and reminded himself—of the great things God did. The Book of Psalms has many beautiful words in it; words of praise and faith, words that tell of David's love for God and for His Word. There are many prayers written down too. It's a wonderful book to read when you are sick, or sad, or people are causing you difficulties. There are many good verses to read for times of prayer and praise. The words in the Book of Psalms can encourage and strengthen you, just like David's times of prayer and praise and talking with the Lord helped him.

Saul wasn't a happy king anymore and was often angry and making things difficult for David. This made David very sad, and caused him have to move away from King Saul and away from his best friend, Jonathan. David and a team of men that wanted to help him, lived outdoors often, or in caves. When King Saul was acting unkindly and in anger, David was patient and wise and gentle. Sometimes King Saul then apologized to David for acting wrongly. Kindness was the solution to the troubles. God kept David safe and gave him strength for his job of helping to make the country a safe place—and the job of learning what he needed to, before it was his turn to be the king.

One time, a kind lady named Abigail heard that David and his men were hungry and needed food. She and her family were rich and had plenty to spare. Others were being selfish and didn't want to give anything to David's team, even though they had plenty. However, Abigail quickly brought all the food she could and gave it to David and his men. She shared things like raisins, bread, fig cakes, meat, and corn. It made them happy and brought peace. Later on David invited her to live with him, and she became his wife. She wanted to be around someone who loved and followed God.

David learned to have faith, as things weren't easy for him. But whenever he prayed and trusted God, he saw things get better. David knew God was so very close to him and would always take good care of him.

King David and Dancing

David was at last crowned the new king, and he was a man who loved and followed the Lord. His heart was filled with God's word, and he was often praying and praising the Lord. This helped him through the many difficult times that he had. Sometimes he was sad, other times he was sick, and sometimes he had very hard jobs to do while helping to rule and protect the Israelites. When King David prayed and trusted in God, he was given the strength and faith to keep going and to not give up.

God blessed, protected, and healed King David when he prayed. He cared most of all about making God happy, and did what he knew God wanted him to do. King David was a good king because he tried to set a good example to others of loving God and His word. He would often ask the prophets to hear from God and tell him what God wanted him to do, and whatever God told him, he would do.

However, when he made mistakes or he did something that wasn't right, he talked with God about it and was sorry, and chose to change and do things better. God loved David and forgave him. wanted to praise God more than just within his heart, nor only with his voice in song, or his hands raised in praise, but with his whole body in a lively dance before the Lord. He felt happier than words could tell, and this was his way to show he was overflowing with joy!

This made God happy! David wanted to show his love by praising God as often as he could, and he especially liked to sing songs and play instruments while praising the Lord. Songs helped to cheer him up and made the Lord glad! Do you like to sing and dance and use instruments to praise God too?

Instructions and Supplies for Solomon

King David had a special son named Solomon. God loved him and said that he would be the new king after King David. God said he would be as a father to Solomon and take care of him. King David taught his son about God and told him that the most important thing to do is to respect and obey God's Words. Solomon loved God and listened to what his father told him, and wanted to follow in God's ways.

When King David was old he told everyone that Solomon was to be the new king, and he let Solomon ride on his mule and sit on his throne. Solomon was anointed with special oil to show that God was giving him a new and important job and would give Solomon His Spirit to help him do the job. Everyone was very joyous and sang and cheered and played on musical instruments.

Solomon was given a very big and special job by his father, David. Solomon was to build a big and fancy temple. The Ark of the Covenant would be placed there, and the people who loved and served God could offer prayers and praise there, too. Of course they could pray and praise God anytime and anywhere! But it was just a place to remind them that God was really there with them, and they would do well if they gave Him their respect and love. A building that could remind them that God should have a special place in their lives—just like the fancy temple for prayer had a special place in their country.

King David prayed and asked God to show him just what the temple should look like, and David drew the plans and wrote down the Lord's instructions to tell his son Solomon and others how to build it. He also began to collect wood and marble, metals and gold, and precious stones to make the temple like a beautiful palace for God, their powerful and loving King!

The people were very glad when King David told them about it, and they promised to help King Solomon build it. Old King David was very pleased to see how happy everyone was, and was thankful that his son Solomon loved and followed in God's ways and so could now be the new king.

The Temple is Built

Jesus lives with us and is near us no matter where we are. We don't need to have a building to pray in, to be close to Him. However, that is what the Israelites needed when Solomon was the king, to help remind them that God was the most important King of all, and they needed to listen to Him and obey His words.

King Solomon followed through on his father David's plans and instructions for the temple that he was given the responsibility to have built. Finally, after years of hard work by thousands of workmen, at last the special temple was built. The wood had been given to King Solomon by King Hiram, who loved and respected King David and wanted to then help and be a friend to David's son Solomon, when he was the new king.

Many good quality supplies were used to build the temple. Cedar and fir trees from Lebanon; gold and silver; brass and iron; precious stones and marble; large stones that were cut to just the right size; beautiful coloured cloth, and many other things. It took seven years to complete the work. They persevered until it was

finished. Many people gathered to celebrate and to see the newly built temple for prayer and worshiping the Lord. It was a big time of prayer and praise, rejoicing and singing with musical instruments.

The Lord loves good music, happy songs, songs that tell others the wonderful things He has done. This gives everyone joy and faith, and it brings God's Spirit near to those who are praising Him. King David previously had many musical instruments made—thousands! These were to be used for praising the Lord with songs. The large families of Asaph, Jeduthun, and Heman were all very clever in playing music and singing songs, and they would serve the Lord in this way in the newly set up temple. King David previously had appointed and provided for them to do so.

Inside the new temple was a special room prepared to house the Ark of the Covenant. Two very large cherubim angels were made and set up in this room. The cherubims had two huge wings that reached from the wall on one side of the room to the wall on the other. They faced each other, and were all covered over in gold. Between them is where the Ark of the Covenant was placed.

King Solomon offered a prayer of dedication and asking for the Lord's blessings and forgiveness for all the people. Then God showed everyone a sign of His power and demonstrated that He was right there with them. He sent fire from heaven down onto the altar where King Solomon was praying! Do you like getting answers to your questions? It feels nice, doesn't it? Not always do people know the answers to other's questions, but God always does. He knows everything, and He knows what you need to understand. No matter who you are, or where you are, you can pray and ask God for wisdom, and He will give it to you.

A King's Proclamation

After Solomon was the king, there were other kings who ruled. Some followed in God's ways, and some didn't. King Asa was a good king who wanted to follow God's Word, and knew that it would make their country nicer and more peaceful if they did. God would bless them for obeying him. He proclaimed that everyone in the country, all people of all ages—old and young—and even those who were from other lands who were living with them, should do things God's way. It was the best decision the king could make, as it would help the country the most.

One day the woman's child got very sick. It seemed like his life had ended. The mother took her son to Prophet Elijah to pray for him. After the prophet prayed desperately for the boy's healing, the boy opened his eyes and was alive and well. Everyone was so happy!

Fire and Water

The crops hadn't grown for years, and the people didn't have enough food, since it hadn't rained. Finally, it was time for God to send the rain. There was something that needed to happen first, however. People needed to start doing things God's way, and needed to love, respect, and believe in Him.

Prophet Elijah did as God instructed and called the king and the people of the country to meet together on Mount Carmel. There they would get to see God's power. When everyone was ready, Elijah set up an altar of prayer and had lots and lots of water poured on it. God wanted to demonstrate to all the people there how close and real He was. Elijah laughed as it was very silly to try to make something amazing happen without God's help. Then Elijah prayed, and right away God sent a powerful fire from Heaven, and it burned up everything on his altar in a flash! —The wood, stones, dirt and water too! Everyone was amazed and knew that God was real and powerful and that they better stay close to Him and obey His Word!

Prophet Elijah then prayed earnestly for the rain to finally come. He prayed seven times! Then the clouds began to form and soon it was pouring down rain. The crops could grow again and everyone knew that God was going to take care of them, as they chose to love and respect Him.

Heavenly Food and Encouragement

When Elijah was tired and feeling down. He needed a quiet place to rest. Under a juniper tree he took a nap. He didn't have any food and didn't know where to go next. Prophet Elijah had done a good job and obeyed what God said to do, and God wanted to encourage him and give Elijah what he needed.

Elijah felt someone waking him up. He looked and saw it was an angel! This angel gave him water to drink and had baked him some fresh bread right there, over a little fire of coals. Elijah felt so much better after eating the food from heaven that the angel brought, and drinking the water. He then went back to sleep for a while. The angel woke him one more time and gave him more Heavenly bread and water, because Elijah was about to go on a long trip and he'd need to have the strength to make it all the way.

Something amazing happened! Elijah travelled for 40 days and didn't even need any food during that trip. God's special miracle bread from heaven had given him all the nourishment that he needed for that journey.

When Elijah arrived at Mount Horeb, he found a cave to stay in for awhile. He talked with God and heard His Words. God encouraged him that he was doing a good job, and that there were new things for him to do. Elijah felt renewed faith and courage to continue on with telling people God's Words and helping them to follow in His ways.

The Boys Who Were Kings

There were many kings who ruled over the Israelites, but many of them did not obey God's Words and this made things sad and difficult.

Some of the few good kings were actually crowned as kings when they were still children. Isn't that amazing? One seven-year-old child was made king, and his name was Joash. A good priest called Jehoiada loved and obeyed God

and helped to teach Joash God's Word when he was real young. When young Joash was the king, priest Jehoiada help to give him good advice and instruct him.

King Joash wanted to fix up the temple that was in need of repairs, and thought of a plan to collect money for the project. A wooden chest was brought and put at the door of the temple, and a hole was made in it. People that wanted to help came and dropped coins in it. Soon there was enough money to do the job.

Another boy was eight years old, and he became the king many years later. His name was Josiah. He also wanted the temple to be fixed up and have repairs made on it. One day a man found a book with important instructions from God written by Moses in it. The book was read to King Josiah. As soon as he heard it, he wanted to obey everything that God had said in that book. He told everyone to follow God and serve Him too, and stopped those who were doing the wrong things. Josiah was wholehearted and eager to do whatever God said to do.

Hezekiah's Healing

King Hezekiah called the people of his country together for a time of prayer and praise. Everyone who gathered for this special time felt glad when they remembered God's love and care. They were sorry for their wrong doing. They prayed for forgiveness and for God to help them.

King Hezekiah talked with them and told them what God's Word said to do. He instructed them in God's ways. People sang songs and psalms and praises to the Lord with instruments and had a very happy time together. When it was time to go home, everyone wanted to stay there for several more days. So they did, and they continued meeting together and worshiping the Lord.

When they finally did leave, they were so filled with God's Spirit that they wanted to change the way things were in the whole country! The people travelled all over the place telling everyone about God's Words and ways and getting others to follow and obey Him too. Then they returned to their homes. Things went well in the country while people made the right choices and respected God and loved Him.

One time, King Hezekiah got sick and was told he was going to die soon, and he had a sore that seemed would not heal. King Hezekiah prayed with all his heart to God for healing and for his life to continue. God told the prophet Isaiah to tell the king that He had heard his prayer and seen his tears and would heal him. God also showed Isaiah what natural remedy to give to the king to help his sore get healed: a lump of figs placed on it. And it worked!

King Hezekiah wanted a sign from the Lord to encourage him and prove to him that he would get completely healed and continue living for a long time. God did something amazing and impossible to show His love and to demonstrate that this indeed would happen. God made the shadow on the sundial go backwards by 10 degrees—it moved to the place it had already been at earlier in the day. It was like he'd gone back in time a bit. That was a very big miracle that only our God who is in charge of the Earth and sun, the universe and time, can do. King Hezekiah was glad for this sign of encouragement. God's promise came true and he lived for another 15 years.

Elisha is Called

Elijah was on Mount Horeb, talking with the Lord about his next mission. God spoke to him in a gentle and quiet voice. Elijah listened real well to God's voice. He said to go to a man named Elisha, and to call him to come and work together with him, as preparation for him to be the new prophet later on. Elijah began travelling right away to do what God asked him to do.

When Elijah made it to the place where Elisha was, he found him outside working on his farm. He had 12 yokes of oxen working to plough the field. Elijah came up to him and threw his coat over Elisha as a sign that he was being

called and given a new job to do—to live with Elijah and help him. Elisha was to learn from Elijah about hearing from the Lord and being a prophet.

Elisha didn't wait around, he stopped what he was doing and ran over to Elijah telling him he'd follow him and do what God was calling him to do. Elisha first cooked a meal for everyone there, and then said good-bye. He didn't delay, but went right away to obey what God and His prophet asked him to do. He was happy to learn all he could about listening to God and being one of His special messengers.

A Heavenly Ride on a Fiery Chariot

Elijah had been a faithful messenger, telling God's Words to everyone. Finally, it was time for him to go to Heaven. Elisha would be the new prophet, continuing the job of leading people in God's ways, listening to God's Words and passing those messages on to the people. It was hard for Elisha and the others who knew and loved Elijah, to think of him leaving them. God told Elijah the day he was going to leave, and so he told good-bye to those who knew him and were learning to be prophets too.

Elijah and Elisha were walking along and talking, as they travelled to the last places that God told Elijah he needed to visit before he left this Earth. Elisha knew this was Elijah's last day with him, so he wanted to stay closely with him and go with him wherever he went on that day. The two men needed to cross over the Jordan river, and they needed a miracle. Prophet Elijah took his coat and hit the waters with it, and amazingly the water parted and there was dry path going straight across it, for them to walk on. It closed up as soon as they were across.

Elijah asked Elisha if there was anything that he wanted to have given to him. Elisha wanted to have twice as much of the power of God's Spirit as Elijah had! He knew it would be a big job for him to help people walk in God's ways, and he knew it would take lots of Heavenly help to do it.

As they kept walking and talking, all of a sudden a chariot with horses sent from heaven, appearing all bright and fiery, came galloping to where they were walking. With a whoosh of wind Elijah was lifted up into this chariot to catch his ride to heaven! It was very amazing!

Elisha would now be the new prophet that others looked up to and would listen to, as he passed on God's Words to them. Elijah's coat fell down and Elisha picked it up. He carried it as he went to cross back over the Jordan river. Elisha took the coat and prayed for a miracle—that God would be now with him too, and help him. As he hit the water with Elijah's coat, it again parted and he walked across on a dry path. Everyone who saw Elisha knew that God's Spirit was now with him.

Amazing Water and Oil

Prophet Elisha was often called on to help people in difficult situations. He loved the Lord and prayed for miracles, and then would obey whatever God said to do.

One time the water that was in the city of Jericho wasn't clean and pure, and it was causing a big problem for those living there. The people asked prophet Elisha what to do about it. When he prayed, God told him to do something interesting. Good things always happened when he obeyed God's instructions.

"Bring me a new jar with salt in it!" he said.

Elisha took the jar with salt and poured it into the water, and told the people God's promise that the water was now clean and fine and good. Everyone was so glad! It was good that they went to the Lord and to His prophet to find out what to do. Fresh water would make the plants grow well, and the people and animals healthy too.

Another time a miracle was needed was for a woman and her two children. They owed a lot of money to someone, and he was demanding to have it paid back. She was very poor and didn't have anything to give. The only thing she had left was a little bit of oil in a jar. She made the wise choice and wanted to find out what God wanted her to do. She told Prophet Elisha about her problem.

The woman had faith and obeyed whatever Prophet Elisha told her to do—which was God's instructions to her. She was to collect lots of jars and pots and bring them to her house. Then she was to pour her little bit of oil into them, and to just keep pouring until all the jars and pots were filled. The woman did that and she and her children were happily surprised to see the oil from the little jar never ran out, until all the big jars and pots were filled! Now they could sell the oil and have all the money they needed—both to pay the debt as well as for their family's needs. Asking for God's ideas for a solution to a problem, and then doing what He says to do, with an attitude of faith, brings wonderful blessings your way!

Elisha's Room, and a Special Child

As Prophet Elisha walked to different parts of the country talking with and helping people, he needed food and water and places to rest. There was a man and woman that would often invite him to stay and have a meal with them when he passed by their house on his journeys. She realised that he was a man of God and wanted to take good care of him. One time she got an idea of something else they could do.

The woman suggested to her husband that they built an extra room, for Elisha to stay in when he was travelling that way, if he was tired and needed to rest. So they built the room on top of their own house's flat roof, and put a bed, a table and stool, and a candle stick in the room for him.

The next time the prophet came that way he was so happy to see the great gift they made for him—a room to rest in, whenever he wanted to! He wanted to thank them for their kindness and prayed for the Lord to give them a child. This was what the woman had always wished for. The next year, the woman and her husband had a baby boy, and it made them so glad!

One time when prophet Elisha was on Mount Carmel he looked up and saw the woman riding on a donkey towards where he was. He went to find out what she needed. Her son had suddenly gotten very ill and was lying on the prophet's bed at their house. Prophet Elisha went home with her and prayed for the boy to recover, as he had already passed away. The boy then sneezed seven times, and was healed and alive! The mother was so grateful! She held him and was very happy! Her kindness to God's prophet had brought many joys back to her in return.

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Food for Hungry Men

Prophet Elisha and his team of young men who were learning to hear from God too, needed food to eat. They had travelled to a place where there hadn't been much rain so crops in the farms weren't growing well. They put on a big pot to boil and make soup. Some people went to look in the fields all around to find any types of vegetables they could find growing wild; something that they could pick and add to the soup.

However, some gourds were picked from a vine that was poisonous, because they didn't know that it wasn't edible. It made the whole soup bad to eat. Everyone was hungry and had nothing else to eat. Prophet Elisha prayed, and God said to throw a handful of flour into the pot, and then it would be changed by a miracle into good food. God would change it and make it fine to eat. And that's what happened! Everyone was able to have a nice bowl of good, healthful, warm vegetable soup. They were grateful for the Lord's loving care for them.

Another time when Prophet Elisha and his team were in need of food, a kind man brought a special gift. The food from his first harvest was brought to them. He gave them 20 barley loaves and some corn. Instead of eating it all himself with his own household, this man wanted to share it with God and His Prophet and the team of men with him.

Prophet Elisha had one hundred men who were in need of a meal, but the food the man brought wouldn't be enough for everyone to have some. When Prophet Elisha asked God what to do, He spoke and said to go ahead and serve the bread and corn to everyone and that there would be enough—and even some left over. They did that, and the hungry men ate until they had plenty. After they felt full and left the meal, there still was extra food left over for later! God made even more than enough for everyone to get what they needed. As they listened to God and obeyed by faith, God supplied all that they needed.

Humility and Healing

There was an important man in the land of Syria named Naaman, but he had a big problem. He was very sick. It was a sickness that made his skin filled with sores, and there was no cure. He and his wife were very sad. One day his wife's maid gave them some hope.

"If only Naaman were with the Prophet Elisha, he could get healed!" the maid said. She had lived in the land of Israel before, so she knew about the prophet. This was the first time someone had given Naaman hope that he could be healed. He was eager to go and find the prophet.

Naaman and his team went to the king of Israel to ask about getting healed. The king couldn't heal him, of course, but Elisha told the king to send Naaman to his house. When Naaman arrived, Prophet Elisha's servant went out to greet him and tell him the instructions from God that Prophet Elisha had said to tell him.

"Go wash in the Jordan river seven times and you will be healed!" Elisha's servant told the message to Naaman.

Naaman wasn't very happy to go and wash in muddy river, but finally he agreed. When he humbly obeyed what God asked him to do first, and washed seven times, his body became totally healed. He looked and felt great!

Naaman went back to say 'thank you' to Prophet Elisha and to give him gifts, but Elisha told him that it was God who healed him, not himself. He took none of the gifts, as he wanted Naaman to realise it was God alone who healed him. Naaman believed in God when he saw how wonderful and powerful He was, able to do such a great miracle—healing him from his otherwise incurable illness. He would respect and pray to God from then on!

The Axe that Floated

Prophet Elisha helped to teach a team of men how to hear from the Lord, and instructed them in God's ways. Sometimes they travelled around, and other times they stayed in a house with Prophet Elisha. One time, they needed a bigger place to live, so they got an idea to make a bigger place out of logs. Elisha agreed and said they could get to work building. First they would need to go and find some trees to cut down, to use for making the new house.

"Please come with us to the river's edge while we cut down the trees," the men asked Prophet Elisha. So he went together with them as they started on this project. An axe had to be borrowed for this job, and the man who borrowed it was trying to take real good care of it.

After awhile, as the man was working hard chopping down trees the metal head of the axe flew off the handle and splashed right into the water of the Jordan River. Oh dear! It sunk immediately to the bottom of the river. It would be impossible to find it.

"My Father, my Father!" he cried out to Prophet Elisha, for that is what he called him. "The axe head fell into the water. It was the one I was borrowing! What am I going to do?"

Prophet Elisha prayed, and God showed him to do something rather unusual. Elisha obeyed right away. He cut a stick off a tree, one that could float, and threw it on the water in the place the axe head had fallen in. To the relief and joy and surprise of the young man and everyone else watching, the iron axe head also began to float. The man reached and grabbed it out of the water. They thanked God for helping them. The team was working hard doing the part they could do to build a house, and God did the miracles they needed, to make it possible.

The Fruit

The kind and generous woman who helped Elisha by inviting him for meals, as well as having a room built for him to rest in, needed to move to a new place for awhile. Elisha came to tell her that there wouldn't be sufficient food in the country for several years; there would be a famine in the land. It wouldn't be easy for her if she stayed where she lived. Elisha suggested that she, and all who lived with her, move for the seven years that it would take, until the famine was over.

The woman believed God's Words and obeyed Prophet Elisha. She and all who lived with her packed up what they could and travelled to another country, to stay there until things were better again in her own country. After seven years the famine was over and it was time for her to move back to her house with a nice farm and many fruit trees. However, when she arrived she saw that other people had been using her property. She didn't know what to do, so she went to talk with the king about it.

The king was in the middle of hearing about some of the miracles of Prophet Elisha, and how when he prayed for a lifeless little boy, he was healed and alive again. When the woman walked in right then, the king was happy to find out that this was the mother of the boy he'd just heard was brought back to life. When she confirmed to the king that this is indeed what happened, he wanted to help this woman all he could. The king was glad to hear about the good things that were going on, and that this was a woman who had faith in God.

The king sent someone to work out the situation and help this woman's house and property and all her fruit be given back to her and her team again. Because this woman had faith and obeyed what God and His prophet had told her to do, then everything worked out well in the end. Even the things that were difficult at the time, ended up bringing blessings into her life, because she loved God and wanted to do things that pleased Him.

Abundance and Obedience

King Jehoshaphat wanted to do what God said, and he wanted others in his country to hear what God's Word said, too. He selected some good men who read and obeyed God's instructions, and gave them the job of teaching it to others. Those men travelled around the country and read the books of God's Word to people. They taught everyone what God said to do.

Because King Jehoshaphat chose to love and obey God, God let their country have peace and plenty. Many riches and presents were given to him by lots of people all over. He was a good king and did his best to make the country nice for everyone.

One time a team of three kings and their helpers were meeting in an area where they found out there wasn't any water to drink. There were many people and animals that had travelled a long way to get there. They all needed water, so they called Prophet Elisha to pray and find out from God what they should do.

Prophet Elisha asked a musician to play nice music for him while he prayed. Then God talked with him and told him what to tell the kings. "Dig ditches in the valley down there, and without rain coming, water will be there for you." Prophet Elisha told them what God said to do.

The people obeyed, and were so glad to see the miracle that happened the next morning. There was water that was rushing along the ground and came and filled up all the ditches, turning them into little pools of water. Everyone had refreshing water to drink. It was good they had faith to do the hard work of digging the ditches. God blessed it and supplied for them what they needed.

Amos, Joel, and Hosea

During the time when the kings ruled over the lands of Israel and Judah, there were prophets sent from God to speak His Words and instructions to the people. One man was Prophet Hosea. He wrote down the messages God gave him and they are recorded in the Book of Hosea.

God wanted him to let the people know that God loved them, even when they were naughty. He wanted them to love Him too, and to say they were sorry, and God would forgive them.

The prophet Joel told of how God can give His Spirit and His Words to anyone now, at this time. If someone loves the Lord and prays, they can receive God's Spirit. They will be able to hear what God wants to tell them, and will have the strength and power to do what He needs them to do. With God's thoughts and ideas, visions and dreams leading His people, they can do a wonderful job for Him.

There was a man called Amos, and he was a herdsman that cared for the flocks and cattle on the hill sides. He also had the job of picking fruit. One day God called him to instead be a prophet and tell God's words to the people. Amos listened to God and told others what God wanted to say to them. He was a faithful and obedient messenger.

Jonah's Trip

Jonah was a prophet of God, and he was given an important message to pass on to the people in the city of Nineveh. The people there weren't doing the things that were right and good and kind, and it was making God very sad. He wanted everyone to feel loved and to know that He cared about them. The wrong doers needed to be told to stop. God sent Jonah to tell them that there would be trouble and difficulty coming their way real soon.

However, when Jonah thought about it, he didn't want to go and do that hard job. He didn't want to have to go to that bad city. Jonah was afraid and chose to not obey what God asked him to do, and instead took a trip to somewhere else. He got on a ship that was sailing to Tarshish, but the journey wasn't an easy one as there was a very big and troubling storm. The sailors didn't know if they would make it to land safely. They tried rowing hard, but the stormy waves and the wind prevented them from reaching shore.

The sailors wondered if the storm happened because someone on their boat had done something wrong and it was a punishment perhaps. When they talked with Jonah about it, Jonah said that the storm happened as a lesson because of his disobedience to what God had asked him to do. He was sorry that he disobeyed, and the other sailors realised the importance of listening to and obeying God's instructions. They all prayed and asked God to help them.

God's solution was something very different. God said that Jonah needed to get out of the ship and swim. And when he did, the storm stopped and was calm again. The sailors believed in God's power when they saw that happen. They turned their hearts to the Lord and learned to respect Him. Jonah was kept safe in the water by God's loving care, and God sent him a new way to travel to the land, so he could go where he was meant to go. A very big fish came and took Jonah for a ride, right inside of his huge belly for three days, and took him to the land. Isn't that amazing?

Jonah prayed desperately while inside the fish. He trusted in God to help me. After three days the fish spit him out on to land. When Jonah was safe and fine on the land again, God asked him once more to go and give the important message to the people of Nineveh. Jonah quickly obeyed and did what God told him to do. This made God happy, as He loved the people there and wanted them to change and start making better and more loving choices in their lives.

Warnings and Forgiveness

Prophet Jonah arrived in Nineveh at last. What an eventful and challenging journey it had been. It wasn't a fun job, but it was a lot better than finding out the difficulties that come when someone chooses to go the wrong way. He knew what it was like to make the wrong choices and to disobey God.

The people of Nineveh were also making the wrong choices and weren't doing things that pleased the Lord. Instead of just stopping them with a big punishment and making things hard for them, God chose to give them a chance to change on their own. That is why He wanted Jonah to go there, to give them a warning—to be like a warning sign that says "wrong way—danger".

Jonah told everyone that soon there would be hard times and unpleasant consequences for them for all their wrong and hurtful ways of living. He told them God's message, that their city would be ruined in 40 days, because of all the bad that was going on in that city. Thankfully, everyone listened and decided that they wanted to change. The king announced that everyone needed to stop doing their wrong and unkind deeds, and for all the people of the country to have some days of prayer and desperation. They fasted and prayed and showed they were sorry, asking God to forgive them.

When God saw that they were sorry and wanted to change, He chose to give them another chance. He didn't give them the trouble that He would have given them if they hadn't chose to pray and decide to do things God's way.

Jonah didn't understand why the trouble that he announced was to come to Nineveh in 40 days, didn't come, so God helped explain it in a special way. One night God made a gourd plant grow very fast and big right over the stick shelter that Jonah was resting under. This helped to provide more shade for Jonah in the hot day. He was glad. But then in the night a hungry worm nibbled on the stem and it made the gourd plant and its leaves wither. Jonah was sad. Then God explained that He felt the same way about the people of Nineveh; He would rather they change from their wrong ways, rather than having their city get ruined. Just like Jonah didn't want the plant to get ruined, God didn't want Nineveh to, either. Jonah learned to understand why God chose to give them another chance, since they were sorry and wanted God to help them.

Obadiah and Micah

Obadiah was a prophet who lived long ago, and he listened to God's messages and words to him. One time the Lord told him that those who were very proud of themselves, and didn't act in humility and love, were going to have troubles. These people lived in strong houses carved out of the rocky mountains, and they thought they were better than everyone else. They were not humbly showing God that they needed Him and wanted to do the

right things that make Him happy. Instead, they proudly thought that their nation would last forever and they could do whatever they wanted, even if it was hurting others.

Just having a nice house and being strong and smart isn't going to bring you great things for the rest of your life. It's best to do things God's way and to obey His Words. This is what will bring God's blessings into your life. This nation did not last forever; the people eventually passed away, but the Words of God telling us the lesson on humility, still remain. Many people know the name of the humble and obedient prophet Obadiah, because he listened to and passed on God's Words; but no one today knows the names of those in the proud nation living in strong rocky houses.

The prophet Micah was told by God where Jesus was to be born, when it was time later for God's Son to be born on Earth—in Bethlehem. Many years later, the Wisemen, those kings from the East, were asking where Baby Jesus was born. This prophecy was looked up and read and it helped give them guidance.

Prophet Micah also wrote about the wonderful world of the future, when Jesus comes to rule the Earth and all people know about Him and learn to do things His way. One day, the world and everyone living here will be at peace, and it will be a great place to live, with many of the difficulties taken away, that are in the world now. One day Jesus, will come back and be the King of everyone, and then things will be nice again on Earth. That's something you can look forward to!

Nahum and Habakkuk

Nahum was another prophet who listened to God's Words and did the things He said to do. He wrote down God's messages and was faithful to pass them on to others. Nahum spoke of how wonderful it is to go around telling people the good news—just like many missionaries do, giving the message of Jesus' love to people all over the world.

The Lord also showed him a vision or picture in his mind about what modern transportation would be like today. We can use the fast ways of travelling nowadays to go and reach people in faraway places all over the world with the message of God's love, and truth, and Jesus' gift of salvation!

That's like what the prophet Habakkuk wrote about in his book. He wrote down that one day people everywhere would know about Jesus! Isn't that a wonderful thought? When people know that Jesus loves them, and they learn from His Word how to live in love and peace, the world will be a happy and nice place to be.

Habakkuk also reminds us to praise God no matter what is happening—even if things are difficult and we don't have all that we want. Did you know that as you speak words of faith and praise to Jesus, that it makes wonderful things come your way? Jesus blesses those that trust in His care, rather than complaining about what they don't have. With Jesus helping you, He can make everything work out well for you. Jesus will answers your prayers and provide for you. He loves you!

Ezekiel the Prophet

Ezekiel was a faithful prophet and priest. God often told him to do some unusual and difficult things in order to get people to listen and remember what God wanted them to know. Do you ever play dress-up or act things out, or make modals of miniature towns? Ezekiel's job was not just to tell people God's words, but to also act things out and show the message from the Lord using props and displays and skits.

It was Ezekiel's job, as a prophet, to tell the people what God need them to know, and to instruct them to do things God's way. He warned people of the trouble that would come to those who kept on in their disobedience and lack of love and respect for the Lord.

Ezekiel's job was to give people God's words, even if they didn't listen or choose to change and to follow and love the Lord. It's the job of anyone today, as well, who wants to serve and help Jesus—to pass on the message of Jesus and His Word. Not everyone will listen and do what they should, but Jesus will be pleased that those who love Him do their best to help others come to know Him, no matter what others say or do.

God told and showed Ezekiel so many things that people then needed to know back then, and God told him about the future as well. There are some things written about in the book Ezekiel that have not yet happened, but they will happen in the future. Isn't that interesting?

Wings and Wheels

Some of God's prophets got to see and experience some wild stuff when they took time to hear from God. One time the prophet Ezekiel had a vision of what looked like the Lord's throne, above in the heavens. It was glowing and shining. He saw also a heavenly vehicle with amazing wheels. Everything was very bright and beautiful, like the best and most precious shining jewels. Ezekiel tried his best to describe what he saw, but it was hard to put it into words we today would easily be able to understand and picture in our mind. It was truly unearthly. He'd never seen anything like it on Earth before.

There were angels called cherubims on this flying vehicle. These were very big and powerful angels. They could see well in all directions, and were very bright and shining with big wings that made a wonderful sound—it sounded like God speaking! Between the cherubims and the wheels of the heavenly vehicle there was a type of heavenly fire. This vehicle was for special transportation. Maybe when you get to Heaven, Jesus will let you see some of the amazing vehicles there are. Would you like that?

When the Lord called the prophet Isaiah to be His messenger, it was a memorable event! He saw a vision in the spirit of powerful angels around Jesus on a throne in Heaven. These angels were called seraphims, and they looked amazing. When they spoke words of praise to God even the door posts shook, and the house was filled with God's heavenly cloud.

Isaiah didn't know if he was good enough to do the special job of speaking God's Words to others, but God cleansed his mouth and spirit, and empowered him to do the job. He heard the Lord speak and say, "Who can we send?" and Isaiah answered, "Here I am! Send me!" He was willing to be the one to pass on God's Words to people—not just for those who lived back then, but he wrote it all down so people nowadays can read those messages too.

Isaiah the Prophet

There are wonderful prophecies in the Book of Isaiah that talk about the way Jesus is going to make the world one day—peaceful and pleasant. The thorns will be taken away, and the wild animals will be nice and gentle, eating grass just like the cattle do now. Jesus will be the King, and it will be a beautiful and enjoyable world in the future. Won't that be terrific? Just think, all the unpleasant and difficult and hurtful things that are now on Earth will be taken away. Food will grow well and easily, and people will live together in peace.

Some of the messages that came from God to prophet Isaiah told of when Jesus would come to Earth and live humbly and give His life willingly for the salvation of others. He wrote telling that when Jesus came to Earth, that He wasn't going to look all fancy, like the best-looking man around, arrayed like the King He really is. His appearance was humble and common. Isaiah wrote about how Jesus would have sad times and things would be difficult for Him, and He would be able to understand what it was like to live on Earth. This way Jesus could help us better and comfort us.

Isaiah also wrote that God's Word is like refreshing rain and how wonderful it is when people go around telling others God's Words of love and peace, joy and truth; and passing on the good news of Jesus' gift of salvation. Another message in the Book of Isaiah said that those who help and give to others, and are kind and caring, will receive wonderful things from Jesus—supply of their own needs, healing, and many good things.

Isaiah was a faithful and obedient prophet who said and did whatever God told him to. Those who follow this example today and pass on Jesus' Words and message of love to others make Jesus happy!

Jeremiah the Prophet

Jeremiah was a prophet who God called to speak His Words. He wasn't an older man, and he felt like he was quite young still—too young to do what God was asking Him too. But God knew He was the right young man for the job. God told Jeremiah, that even before he was born God knew all about him and he was sent to Earth to be a prophet.

Jeremiah obeyed God and chose to speak God's Words to others. A man called Baruch was a great help to him, and wrote down the words of prophecy for Jeremiah on scrolls, and read to others the words that God was passing on to them. The King wasn't happy to hear the warning messages that were read to him from the first scroll that was written, and even though people begged him not to, he went ahead and burned it. However, God told Jeremiah to make a new one, and told him what to say, while Baruch the scribe wrote it down again—and this new scroll had even more messages and words added to it from the Lord than the first one.

Life was very hard for them all then, and they wished they had listened to what God had been telling them through His prophets for many years.

God blessed and protected Jeremiah because he was a faithful and strong messenger, telling people God's Words. When others had to leave their home country, Jeremiah was given the freedom to still live there. He spent much time praying and listening to the Lord. He was able to talk to others who were still there in the ruined country, and encourage them. Jeremiah knew what it felt like to have sad and difficult things happen, and he learned to hold on to God's promises of eternal love and care, through the hard times. Things will always get better for those that trust in Him. God will hear and answers the prayers of all who ask Him for help.

Tough Times

Jeremiah was very sad to see the people having a hard time and seeing all the troubles that came their way. He prayed and knew that Jesus was close to them anyway, even in the sad and difficult times.

Jeremiah reminded people that God would love them forever. Eventually they would get a chance to return to their country again, and Jesus would help them and care for them all no matter where they were—if they chose to love and obey Him and pray for His help.

Once God told Jeremiah to go and watch a potter working on making a clay jar on his potter's wheel. The man saw that something wasn't right with it and he so started again to make it better. He was then was able to make something good out of the clay.

A message from God came to Jeremiah about it. God is like a potter, and those who love Him are in His hands, like the clay in the hands of a potter. If we let God change us into something better and teach us new things, then we will be useful and beautiful.

This message encouraged Jeremiah and the people, that even if things were very difficult at that time, because of their continued wrong choices for many years, that God still had His hand of care on them, and was going to use this time to change them and the country for the better. Things would be better later on, as they yielded to His hand working in their lives, and let Him change them.

Wise Young Men

Daniel and his friends Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego had a life-changing adventure during the time when many of the Israelites had to leave their land. King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon wanted some wise and good helpers to talk with, who could give him good ideas and counsel him. He needed those who were in good health, who had learned a lot, and who could apply themselves to study and learn many new things and learn how to speak a new language as well. Young men were chosen from the land of Judah, sons and descendents from the king and the princes of the land and brought to Babylon.

When these men were being trained and taught many things, the king wanted them to have good food to eat. He wanted his new helpers to be fit and healthy. However, the food that the king was telling his servants to give to four of these young men—Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego—wasn't the best and would not make them healthy and strong. Daniel asked Melzar, the man in charge of their care, to please only serve good, natural, healthy food to him and his friends. After ten days had past, Melzar took a good look at Daniel's team of four, and compared them to the other young men who had eaten unhealthy food and drinks. Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego were indeed the most healthy and strong and good-looking, as they had chosen to eat what God wanted to. Good food made them able to also focus better on their studies and learn all that they needed to learn. Their obedience to God brought His blessings on them.

When the young men were brought before King Nebuchadnezzar, he asked them questions and talked with them. He saw that Daniel and his friends who loved God and prayed and listened to Him, were the wisest and cleverest of everyone around. The king said they were ten times wiser than then his other counsellors. Obeying Jesus, listening to what He wants to say, and making the right choices will make you wise too!

Job's Lessons

Job was a good man who loved God and did what was right. He was often praying and asking for God's forgiveness for others, so God could bless them. God sent lots of angels to protect and keep him safe. He was blessed with many things, lots of animals, and was known by many for how wealthy he was. However, he had a big test come into his life: Would he still love and trust in God's wisdom and care, even if things were going bad for him? Even if he was no longer rich and lost all that he had, and was sick and in pain?

One day these very difficult things happened to him: Everything he had was taken away from him or ruined; and soon afterwards he got sick and had sores all over his body. He was a poor and sick man all of a sudden. When his

troubles first started, he took it patiently and trusted that God would work it out. But then when things got worse and he was in pain from his illness and sores, he began to despair. He wasn't acting and speaking humbly anymore, but was angry.

His friends talked with him, trying to help him figure what was wrong, and why this all had happened—but they didn't know. But then God came to talk with Job and explained some things to him.

Job had been getting too proud and was speaking unwisely, thinking that it wasn't good that he have troubles, when he was always trying to do the right thing. But God reminded him that compared to God, Job and everyone on Earth knows so little.

God made the world and keeps everything going well. He keeps the oceans in place, He creates and directs the stars, He makes sure all the different types of animals have food to eat, and many more things He does each day that people can't. So when we get sick or we get hurt, or something goes wrong, we don't need to feel upset, but we should be humble and trust that God will make everything turn out for good in the end. He is in control and will hear our prayers and come to help us. We can also remember that when things are going well for us, it is not because of our goodness, for only God can make it so. We should remember to praise Him for all that He allows us to be blessed with each day.

Job learned to be humble, and was sorry for his proud ways of talking. He realised that God was perfect and knew what was the right thing to do. God forgave Job for his wrong attitudes and healed him, after he prayed. And guess what? To reward Job after that hard time of lesson learning, the wise, caring and loving God made things better for Job than they had ever been before! Afterwards, God gave Job back twice as much as he had lost. Things were better for him in the end than they had been before the troubles came to him. And most of all, Job's heart was wiser, humbler and closer to the Lord than before. This gave him greater happiness.

When we love and trust Jesus—even through the sad and sick times—then He can make our hearts wiser and stronger, and will bless us with wonderful things afterward, too! We don't have to understand everything, we just need to remember how wise and loving God is. He knows about everyone on Earth—and even cares for the animals too! He will care for you and bring good things your way as you love and trust in Him.

Queen Esther

King Ahasuerus was the ruler over a large area of land. Many of the Israelites who had been told to leave their home country were living all over his kingdom. One man was named Mordecai, and he had a younger cousin called Esther, who he had cared for like she was his own daughter. She was an orphan and no longer had her parents with her, so this kind and Godly man took good care of her. They were both descendants of the Israelites.

One day there was a big and fancy feast held for the people living in Shushan the palace--the place where the king lived. The feast was for seven days! Everything was set up real deluxe. When Esther's heard about it, she prayed desperately for the Lord to help her and her people. God answered her prayer, and when she went to talk with the king, he listened and believed her when she told him that he had been tricked. The king then made Mordecai have the job of being his close helper instead of the other proud man. Mordecai wrote and sent letters all over the country, in all the different languages that were spoken, with a message from the King. The king wanted them all to be allowed to live safely in his land, and no harm to come to them. Esther was a good and brave queen that her people loved, because she loved and obeyed God.

King Cyrus and King Darius

It hadn't been easy for the Israelites to be away from their homes and country, and they had learned a lot during those many years. At last the time was right to return and be given another chance to follow God again. God put the idea in King Cyrus' heart to allow them to go back to their home country. Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, Malachi

The prophet Zephaniah spoke God's messages to the people, when the Israelites were still in their country, and king Nebuchadnezzar hadn't made them leave yet. It told of the troubles that would come, as they hadn't been following the Lord or listening well to His prophets. Yet, it also tells that the people would be allowed to return again one day to their country.

In one of the messages in the Book of Zephaniah it says how the Lord loves it when people meekly and humbly come before Him and pray. If you are humble and admit your mistakes and ask Jesus for forgiveness, then He can help you to change and will forgive you.

Have you ever had a friend, a true and good friend of yours die? I have. It's not something you ever wish to have happen. But it does make you appreciate the friends and people that you still do have around you, or who make life easier for you in some way.

When people go it can leave a great big gap in your heart or life, and that can be real tough, until you get that empty feeling filled up again with something new.

Imagine all the holes that are made by all the people in the whole world passing away, suddenly and wonderfully getting filled up again with new joys. That is what it will be like in the world and realm to come. Death will be

(time 5:11 date 5/11)

swallowed up in victory, and no more will the voice of mourning be heard in the new land where all wrongs are made right.

It will be like watching a video that is being played backwards and making all the mess disappear, and everything be all nice again. That is what is going to happen one day. It's going to be one victory celebration after another, when all things begin to be put back together again, and all that is ugly is renewed and refreshed and made beautiful again. There will be so much to be thankful for. You'll be new and feel new too, and won't ever die.

When My friend Lazarus died it was a solum and sad occasion, but one that brought greater victory in the end. Why? Because it made so many hungry for the truth and wish for the glory of God to shine through the very awful moment. And it did! The people were ready to embrace a new reality, a new thing! Where the dead come back to life, and the tears of joy wash away the tears of mourning, and where faith springs up in full force where once there was dead hopes.

So just as the true story of the resurrection of My friend Lazarus shows, that God is the God of life and can restore it anytime, so can anything that is dead or dying in your life—be it believe or your physical body—also be upstarted again in full force.

How did you think Lazarus felt once he rose again by the power of the Holy Ghost? He felt he could run a race of a million miles. His heart was so glad to be reunited with his family, because it meant that I truly was the Messiah and the saviour of the world, and could do anything. And with that kind of power aiding and assisting him, so could he also be invincible, and do whatever he was empowered to do.

It won't be long now until full joy will be yours, forever, for you have trusted in My coming and will receive the joy of your salvation.

Heavenly Communication

What is prayer, do you know? It's quite likely that you don't, because it's so simple most people think it's something entirely different.

Let's say what prayer is not:

- --lt's not something that you do out of habit without really thinking about what you are saying or doing. But it takes focused concentration and letting your thoughts be led by something other than what is around you, or that you might naturally be led to think about.
- --It's not just going through the motions or saying this or that in a perfectly scripted way, like memorised lines. But rather thinking about the one you cherish more than any, and trying to speak in a way that will uplift them, and teach those who might be listening in on your prayer, a bit of what this Being is actually like; that through your words others will get to know a bit more of what God is like, and He will be cherished by others as well.
- --Prayer is loving Me to the point of giving Me your time and focus, so we can talk about things that really matter to you, and I can tell you things that really matter to you, even if they aren't anything that you were previously thinking about. We can have a two way conversation, and afterwards things will be different, for I can change and make things better for you and others.

--Prayer is a life line to Heaven, where you can receive what you need to keep living and giving life to others. And while you are on the line to Heaven, that is to say talking to the King of the Universe, you will receive spiritual inspiration, like a battery that gets charged. While you take time in prayer, you not only receive the needed items or gifts from Heaven, but you also get recharged and strengthened so you can keep going stronger and faster.

Jesus and the Children

Do you know that you are very special to Jesus? He loves you so very much. One time when the disciples and others around Him wanted to know who was going to be thought of as the greatest and most important in God's kingdom, Jesus answered them in a special way. There was a little child with his mother nearby. Jesus showed everyone this child and said that children were a good example of what God wants people to be like. "Be like a child," Jesus said, "and then you can go to Heaven, and you'll be an important person there."

How can adults be like children? What was it that they should do? To love God as their Father, to have faith that He will take care of them. To be humble and know that they needed God's help and forgiveness and care.

Just being thought of as an important person on Earth wouldn't make you the way that God thinks is great. He likes the love and joy and simplicity of the children. They make Him very happy.

When mothers brought their children to see Jesus He was so happy to see them. He loved the children so much! Jesus told everyone around to move aside and make it easy for the children to come and see Him. There were many people around, and those who thought they were probably a bit more important than young little ones.

Jesus told everyone that the most important thing to do right then was to let the children come to Him. He enjoyed seeing their smiles, he cared about them, and wanted them around. Jesus loved the children very much. He blessed them and showed them how important they really were.

You, too, are very special and loved by Jesus. Even though you can't see Him with your eyes now, just yet, still He is around you and says to you, "Come to Me." You can talk with Him in prayer and know that He will be near to you and take care of you.

Generous Gifts

Do you have anything that is real special to you? Perhaps it's a gift that someone you love gave to you, and you've kept it safe in a special place? There was a woman called Mary, who had something like that. It was a bottle of sweet smelling, fancy and very expensive perfume oil. She kept it safe, and made sure it never got broken. It was made of clay, and could break if it got dropped. It as special to her.

One time when Jesus was having a dinner with a man called Simon, who was a religious man, she came into the room to see Jesus, and bring a gift. Can you guess what it was? Yes, it was her very specially saved perfume. She knelt down at Jesus' feet. She didn't come in all proud and say, "I'm so great!" She had humility and wanted to know Jesus loved and forgave her for the wrongs she had done.

Mary was weeping and washing Jesus' feet with her tears, wiping them with her long pretty hair, and poured her special perfume on Jesus. That was the way she chose to show that she loved Him. She didn't worry about what all the proud people around would think of her. How Jesus felt and being near to Him, was the most

important thing to her. He was more important than her special things, and more important than all the others around.

Mary did the right thing sharing her special gift with Jesus, as soon He would be leaving the Earth to see His Father again. It was the last chance that she had to show Jesus her love in a special way. Jesus loved her and said He forgave her, and she was so happy. Mary felt more joy than she ever had in her life. Her heart felt light and joyful, and determined to follow what Jesus had said for people to do.

Another woman gave a gift to God—it was the last two coins that she had. Jesus saw it when she gave them, and was pleased to see her faith. She knew that if she gave to those serving God, as her gift to God, that He would give her in return all that she needed. When you give and share with others because you love God, then neat and special things happen to you, and you are happier than if you only always kept things for yourself. In the end you have more, as a result of giving.

Important Things

It's important to care for people and to show them kindness. There is something, however, even more important. Do you know what it is? It is taking time with Jesus—to talk to Him, to listen to Him, to be still and quiet, to pray, to read His words, to have time with Him as a friend.

There will always be people to help and plenty of jobs that need to be done. There will be no end of meals that need to be cooked and dishes that need to be washed. There will always be things that need to be fixed, and cleaned, and put away. To even have the joy and the strength to do what needs to be done, as well as to get God's blessings and the supply of your needs, you need time with Jesus.

Did you stop today for a few minutes to say "Hi" to Jesus, and to see if He had anything to tell you? It's the most important thing you can do in a day. And you will be able to give and share with others, help and care for people, do your jobs easier and with more joy, if you do.

One time Jesus was visiting with some friends of His—Mary, Martha and Lazarus. Mary just wanted to sit and to listen to whatever Jesus was saying. Martha felt alone trying to do all the work of serving the meal to Jesus and his disciples. She asked if Jesus could please tell Mary to come and help her. Rather than agreeing that this was important, Jesus told Martha that it was more important to Him to have people listening to His words, and spending time with Him. Helping was a good thing, but taking time with Jesus first of all was the best, and would make them the happiest.

What do you think Martha did after that? What would you have done? I bet it felt good to just relax and stop worrying about all that needed to be done, and to just spend time with Jesus, hearing His words.

Marvellous Moments on a Mountain

It was nearing the time when Jesus was soon going to leave the Earth, and be with us all in a new way—as the powerful Son of God who is usually invisible, and can be everywhere at the same time. While He was still on Earth He spent as much time as He could talking with His disciples. He needed to get them ready to be His witnesses, to go in to all the world to preach the Gospel to all they could reach with His message of salvation and love.

One time Jesus took three of His closest followers for some time away, to talk, to pray, and to see something very special. Up the mountain they climbed, until they found a resting place. When the disciples looked up they were shocked at what they saw. Jesus looked so very different. He was changed for a little while,

Hosanna in the highest!" And to make the pathway extra special people decorated it by cutting down big palm branches and placing them on the road. Others put cloth and coats on the pathway for the donkey and colt to walk on.

It was a like a royal parade and a big welcoming party, for Jesus the king. The children were having a great time too, praising God and getting to see Jesus. When they reached Jerusalem, some people were wondering what was going on, and what all the excitement was about! —Celebrating Jesus was the reason! When they got to the temple people came to be healed by Him. He answered many questions, and taught them about God's way. He told stories and parables to the people. Love and Humility

He told them that they needed to take care of each other, and show that they were His disciples by giving love, and acting in humility. Jesus then took a bowl of water and a towel, and went around washing each of the disciples' feet. This was normally the job for a servant. Jesus said to be as servant to each other, rather than just thinking they were so important, and wanting others to serve them. Those who helped others in whatever way was needed, not acting in pride, but humble, were really the greatest, and behaving in the way that Jesus most wanted them to.
