- The true story of how the nice world got corrupted, changed and reshaped.





When God first made the world He also made a beautiful and lovely garden. In His nice Garden of Eden, God placed some special trees with unusual fruit.





Adam and Eve's choices in the garden resulted in a change in the world, in difficulties becoming a part of the world—things that affect people today.




After about two thousand years since creating the world, God saw that the many people who were living on the world were only thinking thoughts of harm and bad things. He knew it would only get worse.

In the ark he and his family—his wife, three sons and their wives—would be safe during the flood. It wasn't easy, and it took a lot of perseverance and hard work for many years.


God told Noah to also bring into the ark two of every type of animal and creature that lived on the land. Many of the animals that lived in water would survive the flood.

Rushing water moving around to get into its proper place of seas and oceans and lakes cut great canyons and gorges. The geography of the world was very different.


The fossils that are found today were formed during this flood, through plants and animals being quickly covered by water and sediment. Coal and oil were made then too out of the old world's trees and plants.

God wanted them to stop doing it, and instead go and live in other parts of the world, to travel around, and to form smaller communities living here and there.



And that is how the varied languages on Earth began.




