

*Able to wait calmly for something desired.

*Showing or characterized by patience.

*Steady; diligent; persevering.

Longsuffering:

*Bearing injuries, unkind words, and trouble patiently for a long time.

*Long and patient endurance of pain, insults, and difficulties.


Ecclesiastes 7:8



(Imaginary story)


Annie and the Truck Driver

"Well, I don't have far to travel, but at this rate, I'll never make it in time!" the car driver said.


"Where are you going?" Charley Churrusting asked.

"So if I just stay calm, and set my eyes upwards to the One Who is actually in charge of my life and is caring for me—Jesus— then I can take things in stride more.





"I've got what I need. I just don't particularly enjoy having things breaking down. I need things that are dependable," Marvin Merryglad said.


His tune and whistle were long forgotten, he scanned the road's edge hoping to see a service station as soon as possible.

Galatian; 5:22-23



He sighed, and kept on driving as best as he could. At long last, at the second service station he spotted he was able to get some of his mini-troubles taken care of. The tyre got air,




the windscreen got cleaned, and the wipers adjusted. It turned out to be something minor, thankfully.

The Bicycle



My kind brother seeing how much I wanted it rode it over to me, got off, and calmly gave it to me.





I had already let myself get upset, and was being so very impatient, so I didn't even say thank you. Instead I continued speaking unkindly and angrily, telling him that he should have turned the bike around for me, so it was facing the right direction for me to ride it.

My brother didn't even get upset, or say anything back at all. He patiently helped me turn the bicycle around like I wanted. But the Lord wasn't happy with my anger, impatience, and the unkind way I was talking to my brother. So Jesus allowed me to get hurt.

There was something sharp on the bicycle, for some reason. It seemed there was a piece of metal that was sticking out of the bicycle and it cut the back of my leg badly while I tried to get on. I still have a scar on my leg from it. At that moment when I got cut, I knew exactly why it happened—to calm me down, to teach me to not act in that angry, impatient way. Mummy helped me to bandage it up, and I couldn't ride the bike then—not for a long while until it healed.

So, my patient, kind brother got to keep riding, and I who wanted it so much, and wouldn't wait or talk nicely, had to miss out for a long time, due to the little accident. Impatience cost me what I wanted rather me than getting to have it. It just didn't work.

I was always very short and rather small—at least compared to my friends. One of my best friends when I was a child was taller and bigger, even though she was younger than I was. It seemed to take so long to grow up.

I was eight years old when I decided that I wanted to be 14 years old—but it seemed so very long away.

When you are growing, day-by-day, something that is a bit too big may fit you one day. If the shoes

had been too small, as some other shoes were, there wouldn't have been anything I could do to make them fit. So to get to wear these special shoes only required time and growth.

I kept these shoes, trying them on every several months to see if they fit yet. I think I expected to grow into them a bit faster than I did. It took me four years till at last I could use them!

When I was 14 years old, these special, saved white shoes finally fit me. It was a long wait, but in time it did happen.

I grew to be both the age I wanted most to be, and the shoes could finally be used. It took time and patience, but eventually it all happened.



From Jesus to Us

Has there ever been something that you really wanted so much that you had a hard time waiting for it? You thought about it, dreamed about it, and couldn't stop talking about it with your friends? It can be so hard to wait.

That's not the only time you need patience. There are other times, when what you want isn't just an item or an event, but when you have the urge to say something, or to act in a certain way, and it isn't the best thing at the time to do or say, and might make things harder for others, or even for yourself.

These are also times to exercise patience—to wait for the right time to say or do what you are

Ephesians 4:2

With all lowliness and meekness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love. feeling, or to wait till the feeling passes, if it's something that should not be acted on—like anger, or wanting something for yourself that is not best for you to have then.

There are lots of times when patience is just what is needed, rather than the satisfaction of having what you're wanting. And it's hard! It can feel like it's one of the hardest things to do at the time.

It's a difficult skill to learn because it means giving up or going without what you might be wanting, or wishing to have right then and there—



whether it's something you can touch and hold, or see and experience, or something of the heart that you want to feel.

It takes great strength of character to wait; to told your tongue; or go without for a while; to bear with the actions and words of others and not get upset.

To listen to others' thoughts and feelings before saying your own; to see something of yours get lost or broken accidentally by others and take it calmly. To not feel you have to be always on the go, but can sit and relax when you have to wait.

These are a few examples of exercising patience.

So why would anyone want to be patient? What are the consequences of not waiting or keeping control of your temper, words, actions and wishes? The end result is that you miss out on the things that you most want.

Imagine a pilot learning to fly an airplane. He might just want to get to the fun part real quickly, to finally be up in the air. But if he doesn't take the time to study and learn about all the gauges and dials, to get to know all it takes to fly the plane safely, how to deal with weather conditions, how to



land, and all that he needs to know, he won't be prepared or skilled enough to do the job, and things won't go well.

If you want to have friends, and enjoy fun times together, it may not happen if you aren't able to wait for your turn. To have fun with others you'll also need to learn to be tolerant of others' mistakes and to forgive their blunders or the times things aren't just the way you'd like them to be. It works well to patiently wait to say what you are feeling, until it's the right time, and to say it in a kind way.

Learning patience is hard, and comes through having times of not getting all you want at just the time you want to have it. But when you learn to be a patient person you've learned something very important that will benefit you and others so much.

Discussion Questions

*Is there something you've wanted for a long while, and are still waiting for now?

*What's something that others do that bothers you, and it takes you having patience, waiting for them to grow past it, breaking the habit, and learning not to do it?

*When there is something that you all-of-a-sudden just really want to do, right now, and you can hardly wait for a second—but it's not working out to do it immediately—what can you do to help yourself bravely and patiently wait or forgo it if necessary. What things could help you in a time like that? *There's a saying, "Patience is doing something while you are waiting." When are times that you often need to be patient, and what sorts of things can you do while waiting?

(For example:

for a turn with a toy choose something else to do;

for your dinner—help to prepare it or wash some dishes;

for others to be ready for a trip out, when you are the first done—read a book, etc.)



Ideas of When to Apply

When are some good times to practice being patient and having longsuffering?

*Waiting in line for a ride.

- *When you need someone to help you, and they are busy helping others or doing something else first.
- *When others keep doing something that you don't like, and you've already told them not to before.
- *Waiting to grow taller, or become a certain age, so you can enjoy something you are hoping will happen then.

*Waiting for a garden to grow.

*When you are sick and hurting, and it seems to take so long to be healed.



- *When teaching someone how to do something that they don't seem to be able to learn too easily—but you learned how to do it well, and it wasn't hard for you.
- *Being stuck in traffic with your family, and you need to be somewhere by a certain time.
- *If someone hurts you by mistake, or spills food or a drink on you by bumping you accidentally.
- *Waiting for special days or events.
