A. Charles, in his young life has already set foot in half a dozen countries. He would love to explore the world, and one day plans to!




Captain Wollock then thought, if he was afraid, his ships might sink too. So he decided to have courage.


"You came just in time," one man said.

Someone had told the captain, who also came to see. Captain Wollock looked through the telescope.




By this time the sea creature had disappeared again under the waves, yet the captain saw something better.

There was not a single person there on the island. The island was full of trees with fruit. There were all kinds of berry bushes. Some berries had never even been discovered before by Europeans.


It had all kinds of animals, such as birds, dragons, horses and so forth.

There was a stream full of fish. There was a special species of plant growing there.




Before they left, Captain James Wollock instructed the men to stock up their ships' supplies with fresh fruits and vegetables, as well as fresh drinking water they found there.

The natives were very curious about the sailors, since the natives were very dark skinned and they were the only people living there. They had never seen light-skinned people before. They were staring at the sailors.


Whenever a native saw a sailor they stared at the sailor until he was completely out of sight.

On it were jolly, round-bellied men, singing while they swung their mugs of drinks to the music that was being played by the live band on board.


This ship was headed to a nearby tropical island.

They could hear the cheers of the other sailors, and were glad to be back together again.


When the sailors could see land they all cheered! The six ships had all made it safely back.

The king would give him everything that was needed for the next mission.


On the following voyage, Gaptain Wollock was going to set out to find the missing continent, toward the north.

The first thing they noticed was that it was full of unnamed creatures—such as birds with feathers the size of a man.


The continent was huge and the people on it were giants! They built huge houses.

of those on one of his ships.


Captain Wollock was leading all in a prayer for God's safe keeping on their


One of the men was able to put boards and tar on the leak, and mysteriously and wonderfully the water stopped seeping through.

They sent a large lifeboat with five men in it and they paddled over to the sinking ship. They found out that there were 20 men on board and six women.


They called for another lifeboat to come help them rescue everyone that was on board.

Captain Wellock did not agree. He said, "If I have what I need, I have got enough."


They sailed on and arrived on the southern island.

flora: The plants of a specified region or time


fresh produce: Fresh and raw fruits and vegetables


gesture: A movement with the body or part of the body to express ideas, emotions, etc.
